Hay Contest

The Central KY hay improvement program is back and ready for you to sign your hay up for quality analysis. Your participation is all I need, the rest I take care of. I come to your farm and sample your hay/balage. I will have a few short questions to ask you on how you harvested your forage. You will get your results back on the completion of this program. The deadline to sample your forage is September 29th. Call the Extension office at 606-365-2447 to sign up. There will be an informational/awards program to follow. We want you to learn your hay quality but also to participate in the informational meeting. Who knows, you might have the top quality forage and win the whole thing! You don't know unless we test it! This is a program that encompasses the Central KY Counties.

Master Cattleman's Course

Lincoln County is planning on hosting a Master Cattleman's program along with Pulaski and McCreary County. The program consists of 6 in-depth classes. You are highly encouraged to attend each class. A Master Cattleman's Certificate will be awarded once you have completed all the sessions. All sessions will be held in person. Ticks

The Kentucky Beef Network is partnering with UK Entomology and others to conduct a tick study in our grazing systems to document the prevalence of the lone star tick. There will be personnel that walk the pastures that pull a cloth behind them to catch the ticks. It is required for the producer to be onsite if there are animals in the pasture. This is a good way to help our partnering industry organizations to increase awareness about the tick species that we have in our grazing systems and the negative impact they have on our animals and humans as well.

Woodland Owners Short Course

This program aids Kentucky woodland owners in forest resource management, offering online and inperson options. Live session recordings will be available, with participants able to choose between online-only or online plus a field session, each featuring a regional Woodland Owner Resource Extravaganza.

The first WOSC was held in 2004 and consisted of a series of four field days spread out across Kentucky. Since the first offering in 2004, the Kentucky Woodland Owners Short Course has been modified over the years based largely on the feedback from stakeholders and attendees. Over the years, thousands of woodland owners have attended the WOSC and learned how they can make their woodland healthier and more productive.

The online sessions are intended to provide a virtual classroom-based learning environment while also preparing WOSC attendees to get the most out of the field sessions.



Creamy Cucumber and Chicken Salad

½ pound chicken breast 1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice 1 cup slivered almonds ½ cup nonfat plain Greek yogurt 3 ounces reduced fat cream cheese 2 tablespoons Dijon mustard

Marinate chicken breast in lemon juice for one hour. Remove chicken from marinade and chop into bite sized pieces. Sauté in preheated nonstick skillet until thoroughly cooked and no longer pink in the center. Set aside to cool. Toast slivered almonds on low heat in a non-stick skillet until fragrant. Set aside to cool. In a large mixing bowl combine yogurt,

1/2 teaspoon sea salt

1 teaspoon ground black pepper

2 tablespoons fresh chopped dill

2 medium cucumbers, chopped

1 cup dried cranberries

8 lettuce leaves

cucumbers, cranberries and almonds to chicken mixture. Toss to coat. Cover and chill in refrigerator for 1 hour. **Spoon** salad into washed and dried lettuce leaves. Serve cold.

Yield: 8 servings

Nutritional Analysis: 210 calories, 10 g fat, 2 g saturated fat, 30 mg cholesterol, 290 mg sodium, 19 g carbohydrate, 3 g fiber, 14 g sugars, 12 g protein.

Kentucky Cucumbers

SEASON: June to September

NUTRITION FACTS:

Cucumbers are naturally high in water. A ½ cup serving contains only 7 calories.

SELECTION: Choose firm, fully green cucumbers with no yellowing or soft spots. Slicing cucumbers, suitable for eating, are 6 to 9 inches long with small, white spines on the surface that rub off easily. Pickling cucumbers are smaller and have, black spines on the surface.

STORAGE: Store unwashed cucumbers in the refrigerator for up to a week. Sliced cucumbers should be tightly wrapped and refrigerated up to 3 days.

PREPARATION: Wash under cool, running water to remove visible dirt. Slice. You may want to remove the seeds in mature cucumbers by cutting lengthwise and scooping seeds from the center with a spoon.

PRESERVING: Follow recipe instructions. Four pounds of cucumbers yield 5-6 pints of pickles.




